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Rosh Hashanah at Home

Rosh Hashanah begins at sundown on Wednesday, October 2 and concludes at sundown Friday, October 4, 2024.

Tzedakah

We enter the New Year conscious of our blessings and our obligation to share them. We give tzedakah with intention:

Eruv Tavshilin

When Yom Tov falls on a weekday, cooking is permitted, but only to prepare food for that particular day. On Shabbat, all cooking is forbidden. Therefore, preparing food for a Shabbat that follows a Friday Yom Tov presents a difficulty. To allow cooking for Shabbat on the preceding Friday Yom Tov, on Wednesday before Yom Tov, perform the following ritual of eruv Tavshilin, the combining (eruv) of the cooking for Yom Tov and Shabbat

Before Yom Tov begins ((Wednesday afternoon), Take two prepared foods (traditionally a baked food and a cooded food (for example a Challah and a hard boiled egg or a piece off cooked chicken or fish) and recite the following:

*Baruch a-tah Adonai, E-lo-hay-nu melech
ha-o-lam,a-sher kid-sha-nu be-mitz-vo-tav
ve-tzi-va-nu al mitsvat eruv.*

By means of this combining we are permitted to bake, cook, warm, kindle lights, and make all the necessary preparations for shabbat during the festival, we and all who live in this city/locale

Set aside the two foods for eating on Shabbat during the day.
The cooking for Shabbat may now be completed on Yom Tov.

Festival Candles

As with Shabbat and festivals, Rosh Hashanah begins each night with the lighting of yom tov candles.

Light festival candles at home on Wednesday before 6:32 pm and on Thursday at 7:30 pm, reciting two blessings:

On the second evening of Rosh Hashanah, many have the custom of eating a new fruit at this point in the meal, so that we can say Shechianu again on the second night. This fruit is often a pomegranate. The meal ends with birkat hamazon, the blessing after meals, with the appropriate insertions for Rosh Hashanah.



Simanim--Good Omens

Abaye said: ...A person should always be accustomed to seeing these on Rosh Hashanah... as each of these grows quickly and serves as a positive omen for one's actions during the coming year."

—Talmud Bavli, Horayot 12a

Rosh Hashanah Simanim are the special foods served on the first night of Rosh Hashanah,. We say a short prayer about the symbolism of each of the following foods before eating them, as we pray for the blessings of a sweet year!



Dates: The Hebrew word for date is תמר (tamar). The word מ (tam) means to finish, end, or cease to exist. Hold up the date and recite:

*May it be Your will Adonai, our God and the God of our ancestors,
that there come an end to our enemies, haters and those who wish evil upon us*



Pumpkin/Gourd: The Aramaic word for gourd is קרא (k'ra), which in Hebrew means to announce. It is related in sound to the word קרע (kara), meaning to tear. Hold up a piece of pumpkin or gourd and recite:


*May it be Your will Adonai, our God and the God of our ancestors,
that the evil of our verdicts be ripped, and that our merits be announced before you.*



Beets: The Hebrew word for beet is סלק (selek) . The word silek, spelled the exact same way in Hebrew, means to depart or retreat. Hold up a beet and recite:

*May it be Your will Adonai, our God and the God of our ancestors,
that our enemies, haters and those who wish evil upon us shall depart.*

Simanim--Good Omens



Carrots: The Hebrew word for carrot, גזר (gezer), sounds very much like g'zar, the Hebrew word for decree. Eating them on Rosh Hashanah is meant to express our desire that God will nullify any negative decrees against us. Hold up a carrot and recite:

*May it be Your will Adonai, our God and the God of our ancestors,
that an negative decrees against us be nullified.*



Leeks/Scallions/Chives: The Aramaic work for a leek is קראתִי (karati). In Hebrew, the word כרתַת (karet) means to cut down or cut off. Hold up a leek and recite:

*May it be Your will Adonai, our God and the God of our ancestors,
that our enemies, haters, and those who wish evil upon us shall be cut down.*



String Beans or Another Light Colored Bean: The Aramaic word used for this type of bean is רוביא (rubiah). The Hebrew word לוביא (lubiah) means to increase. Another pronunciation for this type of bean may be לב (lev), meaning heart. Hold up a string bean and recite:

*May it be Your will Adonai, our God and the God of our ancestors,
that our merits shall increase and that You hearten us.*



Fish Head: Some communities use the head of a fish on Rosh Hashanah to symbolize the desire to be heads rather than tails, leaders rather than followers. The Hebrew word for head is ראש (rosh), the same word used in Rosh Hashanah, the head of the year. Hold up the head of a fish and recite:

*May it be Your will Adonai, our God and the God of our ancestors,
that that we be a head and not a tail.*

Yom Kippur at Home

Kol Nidre is Friday night, October 11.

Yom Kippur concludes at dark on Saturday, October 12, 2024.

Yom Kippur is the holiest and most solemn day of the year. Its central theme is atonement and reconciliation. Every act, every ritual, every observance and every prayer heightens and accentuates the meaning of the day. Yom Kippur is, therefore, the only festival during which the prohibition of work is as complete as on the Sabbath. Additional prohibitions include the abstention from eating, drinking, bathing, anointing ourselves, wearing leather soled shoes and having intimate relations.

Prior to beginning the fast of Yom Kippur, it is traditional to eat a festive meal so that one is prepared for the fast ahead.

Tzedakah

Teshuva, tefillah and tzedakah have transformational power in our lives. We give tzedakah on erev Yom Kippur to accompany the work of teshuva and tefillah with which we will engage during this season. On Yom Kippur, we experience our own ephemeral nature; giving tzedakkah on erev Yom Kippur, we remind ourselves that nothing is truly ours. In the words of Rabbenu Yona:

*I do not give of myself, not of my body and not of my property,
but I give of the Holy Blessed One, for all belongs to God.*



Festival and Yahrzeit Candles

It is customary to light yahrzeit candles, small candles of remembrance for your loved ones, prior to the lighting of the yom tov candles at which time the actual observance of Yom Kippur commences.

Candles are lit as for other holidays before Kol Nidre services and no later than 6:15 pm, using the following blessings:



Sukkot at Home

The first two days of chag Sukkot are sundown Wednesday, October 16 through sundown Friday, October 18, 2024. The holiday continues for the rest of the week, concluding with Shemini Atzeret and Simchat Torah.

The third of the pilgrimage festivals, Sukkot's prominent ritual features are to build and then dwell in a Sukkah throughout the eight days and to own and bless the lulav and etrog each day of the holiday except on Shabbat.



Ushpizin --Guests

During Sukkot it is customary to invite visitors to eat in your Sukkah. The inspiration for hospitality to guests goes back to Abraham. He would sit outside waiting for the opportunity to invite dusty wayfarers into the shade of his tent, and then run to prepare a meal of the choicest ingredients.

In addition to people invited in advance, we perform a short ceremony to welcome special Ushpizin (Aramaic for “guests”) from our Jewish texts. The full text for the invitation that they join us, including prayers that our fulfillment of the mitzvah of sukkah will be worthy of Divine favor, is printed in a full daily/festival siddur. Then, on the first day we say, “I invite to my meal the exalted guests, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph, Moses, Aaron, and David. May it please you, Abraham, my exalted guest, that all the other exalted guests dwell with me and with you – Isaac, Jacob, Joseph, Moses, Aaron, and David.” On each day, a different one of the seven is singled out, in order. We can also invite the matriarchs and other important women of Israel – Sarah, Rachel, Rebecca, Leah, Miriam, Abigail, and Esther – either paired with the men or on their own.

Feeding others in our Sukkah serves as a reminder of our duty to give tzedakah. It is said that the Ushpizin would refuse to enter a sukkah where the poor are not welcome.



Eruv Tavshilin

Kiddush

It is ideal to eat all meals while in the sukkah. While it is wonderful to have your own sukkah in which to dwell, it is highly encouraged to seize upon the opportunity to say the blessings of sukkah wherever possible, such as in the sukkah at the shul. The kiddush said on the first two days is the kiddush for festivals using the appropriate insertions for Sukkot.

Handwashing and HaMotzi

After washing hands, recite the blessing:

The meal ends with birkat hamazon, the blessing after meals, with the appropriate insertions for Sukkot.

Lulav and Etrog

Lulav and etrog, the four species that are a prominent ritual part of our celebration, are to be held, blessed and shaken each day of the festival except for Shabbat, beginning on the first morning of Sukkot.

To bless the lulav and etrog, begin by holding the lulav with the three branches in your right hand and the etrog in your left hand, at this point with the stem on the top, the pitom (the remnant of the flower) at the bottom. Recite the following blessing:

*Ba-ruch a-tah Adonai, E-lo-hay-nu me-lech
ha-o-lam a-sher kid-sha-nu be-mitz-vo-tav,
ve-tzi-va-nu al ne-ti-lat lu-lav.*

On the first occasion of blessing the lulav, add the following:

The etrog is then turned over with the stem now on the bottom, the pitom on top and together, the four species are waved in the four directions and upward and downward indicating God's presence in every corner of our world.

Shemini Atzeret and Simchat Torah at Home

Shemeni Atzeret begins sundown Wednesday night, October 23; Simchat Torah concludes sundown Friday, October 25, 2016.

These are the last two days of Sukkot, yet each has unique aspects of ritual as part of their celebrations. Shemeni Atzeret is considered by the Talmud as a ‘separate’ festival, thus the rituals most prominent on Sukkot, dwelling in the Sukkah and waving the lulav, are no longer part of this day. Candles are lit and a festival meal follows as with the other festival days.

Eruv Tavshilin

When Yom Tov falls on a weekday, cooking is permitted, but only to prepare food for that particular day. On Shabbat, all cooking is forbidden. Therefore, preparing food for a Shabbat that follows a Friday Yom Tov presents a difficulty. To allow cooking for Shabbat on the preceding Friday Yom Tov, on Wednesday before Yom Tov, perform the following ritual of Eruv Tavshilin, the combining (eruv) of the cooking for Yom Tov and Shabbat


Before Yom Tov begins ((Wdnesday afternoon), Take two prepared foods (traditionally a baked food and a cooded food (for example a Challah and a hard boiled egg or a piece off cooked chicken or fish) and recite the following:

Baruch a-tah Adonai, E-lo-hay-nu melech ha-o-lam,a-sher kid-sha-nu be-mitz-vo-tav ve-tzi-va-nu al mitsvat eruv.

By means of this combining we are permitted to bake, cook, warm, kindle lights, and make all the necessary preparations for shabbat during the festival, we and all who live in t his city/locale

Set aside the two foods for eating on Shabbat during the day.
The cooking for Shabbat may now be completed on Yom Tov.



Festival and Yahrzeit Candles

As with Shabbat, Shemini Atzeret and Simchat Torah begin each night with the lighting of yom tov candles. Light festival candles at home on Wednesday before 5:54pm and on Monday between 6:35 pm and 6:53 pm, reciting two blessings:

It is customary to light a long-burning or yahrzeit candle as well (without a blessing) so fire will be available to transfer for lighting candles on Thursday evening (no later than 6:55pm) or for cooking.

We say yizkor on Shemini Atzeret; many have the custom to light a yahrzeit candle to remember loved ones over the holiday.

Cinnamon Apple Challah Recipe

1 envelope active dry yeast (2 ¼ teaspoons)

1¼ cup warm water (~100 degrees)

3 ½ - 4 cups bread flour

2 large eggs plus an extra yolk for the egg wash

¼ cup vegetable oil

1 tsp vanilla extract

1 tsp cinnamon for the dough and

1 tsp cinnamon for the apples

½ cup plus 1 teaspoon sugar for the dough and

1 tsp sugar for the apples

1 teaspoon salt

2 apples washed, peeled and diced into ½ inch pieces



Whisk yeast and 1 teaspoon sugar with warm water. Let it sit for 10 minutes until puffy.

Mix in two eggs, oil, vanilla, 1 tsp cinnamon, and 1/2 cup sugar into the yeast until all mixed. Then add the flour and salt a little at a time. Mix with your hands into a ball.

Knead dough for about 10 minutes until smooth and slightly sticky; add more flour if it is sticky.

Put the dough in a clean and warm bowl and cover with plastic wrap. Let it rise in a warm place for 2-3 hours until puffy and double in size.

Peel and chop up your apples into 1/2 inch sized pieces and sprinkle with remaining cinnamon and sugar.

Once dough is ready, divide into six sections and roll each one out into a flat piece on parchment paper. Sprinkle some apples at one end and roll up the long way making sure to avoid air bubbles.

Braid the strands

Cover with plastic wrap and let rise another 45 minutes or so until it's light and fluffy looking. Preheat oven to 350 F.


Whisk the last egg yolk with 1/2 tablespoon water and brush over the challah.

Bake for about 30 minutes until golden brown.

Serve with honey!

How to Braid a Round Challah

1. Shape the dough into six strands of equal length.
2. Lay three strands horizontally on a floured surface, then weave the other three strands into them vertically. Lift the bottom strands as needed to weave the top strands in. The ends of the strands will stick out.
3. Now braid the ends together on all four sides.
4. Gently tuck the braided edges underneath the middle section. Voila! A round challah!
