Sundown, Sunday, September 25 through sundown Tuesday, September 27, 2022

Tzedakah

We enter the New Year conscious of our blessings and our obligation to share them. We give tzedakkahwith intention:

Dear God, help us to turn – from callousness to sensitivity, from hostility to love, from pettiness to purpose, from envy to contentment, from carelessness to discipline, from fear to faith. Turn us around, O God, and bring us back toward You. Renew our lives, as at the beginning.

And turn us toward each other, God, for in isolation there is no life. ~Jack Riemer (Mahzor Hadash)

Festival Candles

As with Shabbat and festivals, Rosh Hashanah begins each night with the lighting of yomtov candles and saying the blessing over the candles. Light festival candles at home on Sunday before 6:46 pm and on Tuesday after 7:44 pm, reciting the following blessings:

Apples and Honey

After the hands are washed and the blessing pronounced followed by the blessing over bread, HaMotzi, the addition of dipping apples in honey is added with the following words of blessing and meditation.

Pick up a slice of apple, dip it in honey, and say:

On the second evening of Rosh Hashanah, many have the custom of eating a new fruit at this point in the meal, as we have said the shehechiyanu during the kiddush. The meal ends with birkathamazon, the blessing after meals, with the appropriate insertions for Rosh Hashanah.

Yom Kippur at Home

Kol Nidre is Tuesday night, October 4. Yom Kippur concludes at sundown Wednesday, October 5, 2022.

Yom Kippur is the holiest and most solemn day of the year. Its central theme is atonement and reconciliation. Every act, every ritual, every observance and every prayer heightens and accentuates the meaning of the day. Yom Kippur is, therefore, the only festival during which the prohibition of work is as complete as on the Sabbath. Additional prohibitions include the abstention from eating, drinking, bathing, anointing ourselves, wearing leather soled shoes and having intimate relations.

Prior to beginning the fast of Yom Kippur, it is traditional to eat a festive meal so that one is prepared for the fast ahead.

Tzedakah

Teshuva, tefillah and tzedakahhave the power to transform the harshness of our destiny. We give tzedakahonerev Yom Kippur to accompany the work of teshuvaand tefillah that we will engage in in the long day ahead. On Yom Kippur we experience our own ephemeral nature; giving tzedakahonerev Yom Kippur, we remind ourselves that nothing is truly ours. In the words of Rabbenu Yona:

I do not give of myself, not of my body and not of my property, but I give of the Holy Blessed One, for all belongs to God.

Festival and Yartzeit Candles

It is customary to light yartzeit candles, small candles of remembrance lit for your loved ones, prior to the lighting of the yomtov candles at which time the actual observance of Yom Kippur commences.

Candles are lit as for other holidays before Kol Nidre services and no later than 7:05pm, using the following blessings:

Sukkot at Home

The first two days of chag Sukkot are sundown Sunday, October 9 through sundown Tuesday, October 11. The holiday continues for the rest of the week, concluding with Shemini Atzeret and Simchat Torah.

The third of the pilgrimage festivals, Sukkot's prominent ritual features are to build and then dwell in a Sukkah throughout the eight days and to own and bless the lulav and etrogeach day of the holiday except on Shabbat.

Festival Candles

As with Shabbat, the first days of Sukkot begin each night with the lighting of yomtov candles and reciting the blessing over the candles. Light festival candles at home on Sunday before 6:20 pm and on Tuesday after 7:18 pm reciting two blessings.

Kiddush

It is ideal to eat all meals while in the sukkah. While it is wonderful to have your own sukkah in which to dwell, it is highly encouraged to seize upon the opportunity to say the blessings of sukkah wherever possible such as in the sukkah at the shul. The kiddush said on the first two days is the kiddush for festivals using the appropriate insertions for Sukkot.

Lulav and Etrog

Lulav and etrog, the four species that are a prominent ritual part of our celebration, are to be held, blessed and shaken each day of the festival except for Shabbat, beginning on the first morning of Sukkot.

To bless the lulav and etrog, begin by holding the lulav with the three branches in your right hand and the etrogin your left hand, at this point with the stem on the top, the pitom(the remnant of the flower) at the bottom. Recite the following blessing:

The etrogis then turned over with the stem now on the bottom, the pitomon top and together, the four species are waved in the four directions and upward and downward indicating God's presence in every corner of our world.

Shemini Atzeret and Simchat Torah at Home

Shemeni Atzeret begins sundown Sunday night, October 16; Simchat Torah concludes sundown Tuesday, October 18, 2022.

These are the last two days of Sukkot, yet each has unique aspects of ritual as part of their celebrations.

Shemeni Atzeret is considered by the Talmud as a 'separate' festival, thus the rituals most prominent on Sukkot, dwelling in the Sukkah and waving the lulav, are no longer part of this day. Candles are lit and a festival meal follows as with the other festival days.

Festival and Yartzeit Candles

As with Shabbat, Shemini Atzeret and Simchat Torah begin each night with the lighting of yom tov candles. Light festival candles at home on Monday before 6:08 pm and on Tuesday after 7:06 pm, reciting two blessings:

Recite the festival kiddush with the appropriate insertions for Shemini Atzeret and Simchat Torah:

The meal ends with birkathamazon, the blessing after meals, with the appropriate insertions for Shemini Atzeret and Simchat Torah.

Simchat Torah incorporates the unique joy of celebrating the gift of Torah and our year of study or reading as we conclude the full cycle on this day. Once again, the evening traditionally includes a festive meal along with candle lighting and kiddush as above.
