#### FROM RABBI TAMAR MAGILL-GRIMM

Dear Beloved Community,

This is Beth Jacob's 39th High Holy Day season as a congregation. In the collective imagination of our ancestors, the weeks leading up to the High Holy Days were unique compared with the rest of the year. They understood the month of Elul as a time that held both the mundane and the holy, a time to double down on our individual and communal work while also inhaling the aroma of holiness, feeling closer to our sense of spirituality, more awake to what truly matters.

The sages' metaphor for this intense dual experience was, "The King is in the field." While certain aspects of that metaphor may feel incongruous with contemporary spirituality, the beauty of its meaning can shine through and speak to very real needs in our world today, and this year in particular.

First, the need to be "in the field," to feel like we can make some kind of positive difference, to be actively engaged in working towards healthier and kinder versions of ourselves while also looking for ways to have a positive impact on whatever parts of the world we can influence. The sages identified 39 kinds of Melacha (work) – forty minus one. And here we are in our 39th Elul as a congregation. In a year in which the Jewish reality has often provoked feelings of helplessness and despair, I find strength and encouragement in the sages' understanding of Elul as a time of shared commitment to working for the betterment of our world.

Second, the need for kedusha, for connection to that which transcends the mundane. As we each work hard in our own "fields," the King comes out to meet us. Spiritual connection finds us wherever we are. Kedusha finds us and accompanies us as we do our work, helping us remember the "why." We begin to feel the tangible presence, the sense of connection becoming palpable. In a year in which the Jewish reality has often provoked feelings of existential loneliness, this sense of connection is like a balm to the aching soul. Then, at the end of Elul, we come in from the fields to celebrate together as a community, and the feelings of loneliness abate even more.

There are many reasons the Yamim Noraim at Beth Jacob are special: hearing the ancient melodies and words chanted by members of our shul community, seeing the bags of food donations overflowing bins in the lobby, and the collective breath we take after hearing the shofar's wordless piercing cry/scream/laugh/sigh. Even the bees buzzing around the honey cake at kiddush in front of the shul remind us that we are part of a fragile ecosystem, so we swish the bees away and wish each other a shana tova. Perhaps the sweetest aspect though, really, is greeting each other, seeing each others' faces, and feeling the strength we get from each other. We need that every year, but we really need it this year.

I am so grateful for all of you: for the beautiful community we share together, for the work we do together to make the world less broken, and for the way have continued to celebrate and support each other through one of the hardest years in recent Jewish history – we have been "in the field" together, standing next to each other, helping each other feel a little less alone. I am looking forward to the sweetness of being together in community at Beth Jacob on these Yamim Noraim and praying for a more peaceful world in 5785.

May all in our community be inscribed for a good and sweet New Year.
