A LETTER FROM RABBI TAMAR MAGILL-GRIMM

Dear Beloved Community,

On the High Holy Days, I wear a tallit that is all white and which holds special significance to me. It was the tallit placed on my shoulders by my beloved teacher, Rabbi Sharon Cohen-Anisfeld, when I received my smicha (rabbinic ordination) from Hebrew College.

When the *chagim* ended last year, I kept using that tallit. It didn't feel as though the holidays had ended. I didn't feel a sense of closure or new beginnings. It didn't feel as though our collective prayers had been heard at all, let alone answered. So I continued to wear my white tallit, hoping that at some point that sense of completion would arrive: the hostages

would all be returned to the safety of their homes, the war would end, and the nightmare would be over. At that time it was inconceivable to me that this war would still be going on a year later and that I would wear my white tallit for all of 5784. And yet, here we are.

This year, as the *chagim* approached I found myself asking: How we are to engage in "the turning" this year? What is our collective *teshuva*? Throughout this year I have spoken about how much we need each other during these challenging times. I have urged us to remember that while world events beyond our control can create a feeling of powerlessness, we can turn our focus to the people in our lives and to the well-being of our local community – the places where have the most influence. I am so proud of this community. Even though what we mostly needed was to hold each other, and we did so, we also needed to hold each other accountable, to speak difficult truths, to question assumptions, help each other avoid too much cynicism or naivete. Supporting and challenging each other (as I spoke about last Rosh Hashanah) feels all the more important as we move forward. Our collective teshuva this High Holy Day season will involve more of this kind of engagement. Ultimately it comes down to turning toward each other rather than away. It is a turning that builds, creates ripples of influence and ultimately has tremendous healing power for our world. And while this kind of turning cannot be fully accomplished during this season, this is where it begins. These precious days of reflection are the gift of time and space. May we merit to use them wisely.

My blessing for this year is that through our individual and collective *teshuva* we may truly turn 5784 / תשפ"ה into 5785 / תשפ"ה. The word תשפד, means to be impaled or skewered – a meaning that is sadly too faithful to what we have seen this year. The word תשפה, can mean recompense or payment for harm that has been caused. May the skewering end and the healing begin. May our people and our world not only see better days, but a better year. May our shul community and *Kol Adat Yisrael*, the whole of our people, be inscribed and sealed for a good and sweet year in 5785. May it be a year of healing and hope. And may we radiate that healing and hope outward in all directions.

I want to again express my deep gratitude for each and every one of you: for the beautiful community we share, for the work we do together to make the world less broken, and for the way have continued to celebrate, challenge and support each other through one of the hardest years in recent Jewish history.



Minyan at Beth Jacob

Fifteen years ago, Steve died. We would sit shiva for seven days. Evening minyan was at our house, but morning minyan was in the Saide Chapel. That week, my boys were beside me, just as lost and at sea as I was.

When shiva ended, they went back to their homes and daily lives. And I kept going to minyan. I did not know which end was up.

With my cousin Laurie on one side and Pat Kaplan (whose mother had passed away the day before Steve) on the other side, I stood, I sat, I mouthed the words while they kept me upright. When the eleven months were over, I kept going to minyan...more to pay it forward because I had been a stranger in that strange land of grief and found comfort in that room. Being there wasn't merely an obligation or a habit; it was for all those who relied on the presence of a minyan to recite Kaddish. The act of recitation is important; it is salve for the soul. Within the walls of the chapel, grief does not make one an object of curiosity. The regular minyan folk were there for the mourners, whether it's shiva, shloshim, or yahrzeit. Someone will wrap an arm around shoulders, hand tissues when needed, and support elbows when you don't think you can stand. You are protected in the chapel, allowed to grieve without judgement, tongue clucks, or inane questions. The silence is not scary, nor is it empty. Quiet fills the space when quiet is needed, but it's really not silence; it's the soft lambs' wool of comfort.

Then, there are the windows. Oh, those windows! The seasons change whether we are aware or not; we observe the days, the weeks, the months as they slide by. It doesn't matter when you start; the cycle happens without us. Still, there is an assurance in that parade of nature, knowledge that life does somehow go on. And so do we.

One of Judaism's greatest strengths is that progression of mourning. Shiva is obviously intense, shloshim, less so. And by the time you get through eleven months, you are ready to move forward. Losing a parent, a spouse, or G-d forbid, a child, is a highly personal experience, and there is no halacha on how to navigate grief in your heart. Judaism provides a frame, but it's the community that provides the support and guidance.

Requiring a minyan of 10 to pray is not arbitrary. Quite the opposite; at Beth Jacob, the minyan provides support as well as the understanding of shared experience. Not everyone is in mourning, more people are not saying kaddish than are. Being in the room on a regular basis forms a kind community we don't find in other places: we know each other, we laugh together, we talk about the news together, we become, above all else, friends. And on the days one of us needs a bit more support because of those things that happen in our lives, we're present for each other. Just being in the room is an act of loving kindness. The silence, the shared sighs, the squeezed hand, the occasional chuckle, the familiarity of the nigunim all serve to wrap the mourners in a bit of swaddling to keep us warm and safe as our hearts heal. Mourning within the minyan provides a safety net for us while we are processing.

Moving from shiva into shloshim, then through the eleven months is a process shared in that room. There, everyone accepts your version of the process with respect and kindness. Minyan is a warm, welcoming space whether you come once a year, once a month, once a week, or once a day. In the Saide Chapel, there is community.

My grandmother used to say that every time we talk about our dead ones, they come back to life for a few moments. Our minhag is to share something about the ones we have lost with the community. It's not uncommon for someone to speak about a parent or spouse, only to have others who knew them to chime in. Those remembrances comfort the mourners and serve to remind us that lives lived and lost are not completely gone. As names are recalled, you can see the memories flash in the eyes of the speaker. This is a good thing to share. No one is alone.

But there is more to minyan than just grief, mourning, and saying Kaddish together. Invariably, inevitably, strings of connection become ties to a special yet ever-present community. If you stop coming after Kaddish, you are always welcomed back as if you have come home. Your shul family will ask not just why you've come on that day, but how your life is going, how the family fares, and gee, it's great to have you back in the room even if it's just for one day.

Do not sell that concept short. Once you belong, you belong. The minyan becomes your personal safe space, a place to go when you need a laugh just as much as a hug, a lift for your soul, or just to be wrapped in that tallit of sharing experiences, old and new. Sometimes just showing up because you can give you a lift. Nothing has to have happened, nothing has to happen, but it doesn't matter. Your presence is all you need to bring with you on that day.

We all belong in this sacred place that we share. This is really the soul of community, the heartbeat of our congregation. Yeah, come for the tears of remembrance, but just as important, come for the laughs of camaraderie. We all love a good joke.



CHEVRA KADISHA

This group of dedicated people perform the mitzvot of accompanying deceased members of our community until their burial (Shmira), and preparing them for burial (Tahara). They work with the funeral home to ensure that the rituals are carried out as needed. This means that they make themselves available on short notice.

For Shmira, we organize 2-hour shifts in a room adjacent to the deceased, and continuing in the hearse going to the funeral/cemetery, to ensure that they are never unaccompanied. Tahara is the washing, ritual purification, and dressing of the loved one; then placing them in the casket. This generally requires 4 – 5 trained individuals, taking about an hour of their time.

Each year, members of the Hevra donate 1% of their annual income (anonymously) into a shared pool, research potential beneficiaries, and then collectively decide how to allocate the funds to qualified organizations or individuals.

There are limited spots available in the initial cohort, which will be chosen by lottery. Future cohorts may be established based on demand. Membership is open to any adult member-in-good-standing of Beth Jacob, regardless of age, income, or family status.

CLIMATE ACTION COMMITTEE

Since 2021, concerned Beth Jacob congregants have come together to address and work on the existential climate crisis of reducing greenhouse emissions in and around our building using sustainable climate actions. In 2023 Beth Jacob Congregation was recognized and awarded a certificate as a Climate Justice Congregation by the non-profit organization: Minnesota Interfaith Power & Light.

Actions accomplished from Jan 2023 - Mar 2024: Changed to more energy efficient lights in many parts of the building; installed electric convection oven to replace gas fired oven; in process of switching all cups to recyclable and compostable cups; provide commercial recycling and composting bins at all events in the Sweet Social Hall; participated in a Dakota County project converting our roadside culvert into a rain garden.

Goals for 2024: Achieving weekly no-waste kiddish lunches; host climate educational events; supporting legislative and regulatory actions that reduce MN greenhouse emissions; making additional energy saving and sustainability changes to our building and site.

As we look to 2025 to continue being a more sustainable community; we strongly believe it is our Jewish imperative to take action. Voting is a right and a privilege; many Americans have fought to protect it. Please ensure that you vote!

If you have any questions about voting in Minnesota, please contact the Secretary of State's office 651-215-1440 or 877-600-VOTE (8683), or refer to its website www.mnvotes.gov. They can answer all your questions and deal with special situations. The web site also has early voting instructions, and information on where to vote and what is on the ballot in your location.

To be eligible to vote you must be: A U.S. citizen; At least 18 years old on election day; A resident of Minnesota for at least 20 days; Not currently incarcerated for a felony conviction; Not under a court order that revokes your right to vote.

To register to vote on line you need: Your Minnesota driver's license or Minnesota identification card number, or the last four numbers of your Social Security number, and an email address. You can register with a paper form from the Secretary of State's office, or youcan be automatically registered when you obtain a state ID. You may also register on election day. You do NOT need an e-mail address to register, and even unhoused people can register to vote.
