Director of Community Learning Search Process

The Search Committee, composed of 6 congregants and Rabbi Tamar, is right in the middle of the effort to find our next Director of Congregational Learning. This is an important role that includes running Limudim (children's learning and adult ed), helping prepare our b'nai mitzvah students, overseeing Jewish summer camp advocacy, and other youth and education-related work. When this position is held by a rabbi, they also work alongside Rabbi Tamar to lead services, provide pastoral care, and support congregants during life cycle events, among other rabbinic responsibilities.

We are currently interviewing five highly qualified candidates by Zoom, all of whom are, or will soon be, rabbis. We hope this round of interviews will be complete by mid-January, after which we will invite 3 candidates to visit us in person. We expect these visits will occur from late January through mid-March.

We hope each candidate will come for a weekend so they can experience the vibrancy of our Shabbats together. While each weekend might be a little different, due to previously scheduled events, for each visit we hope to have a Friday night Kabbalat Shabbat and potluck, opportunities for the candidate to teach to various age levels, and a "Meet the Candidate" session where the congregation can get a sense of their background and vision. Thus, there will be a variety of points at which you will be able to get to know the candidates, and experience their teaching and davening, welcome them warmly and show them what makes Beth Jacob a great community to join.



Never-Ending Tales: Antisemitism, Jewish Creative Resistance, and a Literature of Hope

Dr. Jack Zipes, (University of Minnesota Emeritus)

Wednesday, January 21

The “Jewish Question,” hotly debated in nineteenth-century Europe, asked what non-Jews should do with Jews after their so-called “emancipation.” Should Jews be accepted as full citizens or were they too dangerous? That question stamped Jewish identity negatively, but Jewish responses to the Question reveal possibilities that Jews will always be able to survive pernicious misinformation. This lecture will demonstrate how Jewish folk narratives and fantasy writing between 1870 and the 1930s, a period in which Jewish and especially Yiddish literature blossomed, enable us to grasp the dilemmas of Jews who seek to identify themselves by themselves—yet also want to become fully assimilated under hostile conditions in various nation-states. These tales, written largely for a Jewish readership and usually with a self-deprecating humor and ironic twist, stress the necessity of hope—despite worldwide antisemitism—for the survival of Jews and their traditions.

Reconstructing Hadassah Kaplan: A Daughter’s Lessons in the Struggle for Jewish Survival

Dr. Sharon Ann Musher (Stockton University)

Thursday, February 5

How did the family of Rabbi Mordecai Kaplan—founder of Reconstructionism— influence his thinking about women, Jewish law and ritual, and a Jewish homeland? The father of four rambunctious daughters growing up in the early twentieth century—as women’s rights were expanding—Rabbi Kaplan considered how Judaism might become a vehicle for women’s self-expression and creativity rather than a burden in the modern world. With his eldest daughter, Judith, Kaplan initiated the bat mitzvah, a coming of age for girls. His second daughter, Hadassah, joined a small but influential cohort of American Jewish women who studied, worked, and volunteered in British Mandate Palestine, bringing back what they learned to help shape Zionism in America. What role, then, did gender and family play as Rabbi Kaplan developed his concept of Judaism as a Civilization?

A Jewish Language for All Occasions: Ladino Culture and Its Innovations

Dr. Devin Naar (University of Washington, Seattle)

Tuesday, March 17

While spoken today by relatively few people in the United States, Europe, and Israel, Ladino (also known as Judezmo and Judeo-Spanish) melded Jewish, Iberian, and eastern Mediterranean cultures to produce a new and vibrant language that permeated every aspect of Jewish life in Greece, Turkey and the Balkans. This lecture delves into the defining features of the Ladino language as a source of Sephardic resilience and adaptation after the expulsion from the Iberian Peninsula through the creation of serious and humorous Ladino folk culture, and the production of key works of Ladino literature, both religious and secular.



Report on the Veterans' Delegation to Israel

Shortly after the start of the ceasefire, myself and four veterans from the Minnesota Jewish community traveled to Israel. This trip a delegation organized and funded through Partnership2Gether, and the Minneapolis Jewish Federation. The Israeli half of the delegation was in Minnesota back in June. That was first time that the respective halves of the delegation had met in person, and it was a great opportunity to hear their stories, and how impactful their continued military service has been in Israel. Getting the opportunity to travel to Israel, and see everything from their perspective, was an incredible experience.

This veteran's delegation was my fourth time in Israel, having been previously in 2005, 2007, 2009, and now adding 2025. The gap between these two most recent trips was notable for several reasons. Obviously Israel itself has dealt with significant challenges in recent years, changing the country in ways both seen and unseen. But, the same could be said for me as well. Much in my life has changed in these years, and it has encompassed all of my military career; 15 years and counting.

When I think about what was most impactful for me on this veteran's delegation trip, it was hands down the tour of the Gaza envelope. This tour, lead by an Israeli member of the delegation, traveled to the majority of the October 7th sites. The Nova music festival site was absolutely significant, emotional, and painful, but every place carried scars and stories. Every place had a weight to it. When imagining the trauma of the day, it was almost unsettling how quiet all of these places were, save for the occasional spot of machine gun fire or artillery in the distance. A reminder that after two years of war, October 7th is not a scar on the body of the Israeli populace, but an open wound struggling to heal.

Continuing to foster programs like these exchanges is, in my opinion, an important way to share the story of Israel with Jews living abroad. In a world with more noise than ever, personal stories and real connections are more meaningful than ever.

CHESED COMMITTEE

CLIMATE ACTION COMMITTEE

A proposal including cost/payback analysis for installation of rooftop solar photovoltaic panels on our building was presented to the BJC Board at its October meeting. The Board approved the next step of pursuing grants to make the project possible. Two separate grant applications were submitted to different organizations. As of this writing, BJC has been awarded one of the grants and the other application remains pending.

Additionally, the Climate Action Committee has started working with BJC leadership on Beth Jacob's 2026 Climate Action Plan (CAP) to be submitted to the national Jewish climate organization, Adamah, in January. We will be implementing the initiatives included in our CAP throughout the upcoming calendar year. DOROTHY DAY COMMITTEE SECOND SUNDAY OF EACH MONTH

The shelter provides housing, social services, and meals to some of the most vulnerable people in downtown Saint Paul. Joining with other local faith communities, we take responsibility for Sunday breakfast once a month.

We serve a hearty vegetarian breakfast, usually of eggs, potatoes, cereal, and fruit. We prepare, serve, and clean up, serving approximately 300 clients.

Participation is easy. Email invitations are sent out each month. Anyone who chooses to respond comes to the shelter's kitchen at 7:45 am to help cook. We serve breakfast at 9:00 and finish by 10:30. Parking is free, and the warm feeling that comes from helping others is priceless.
